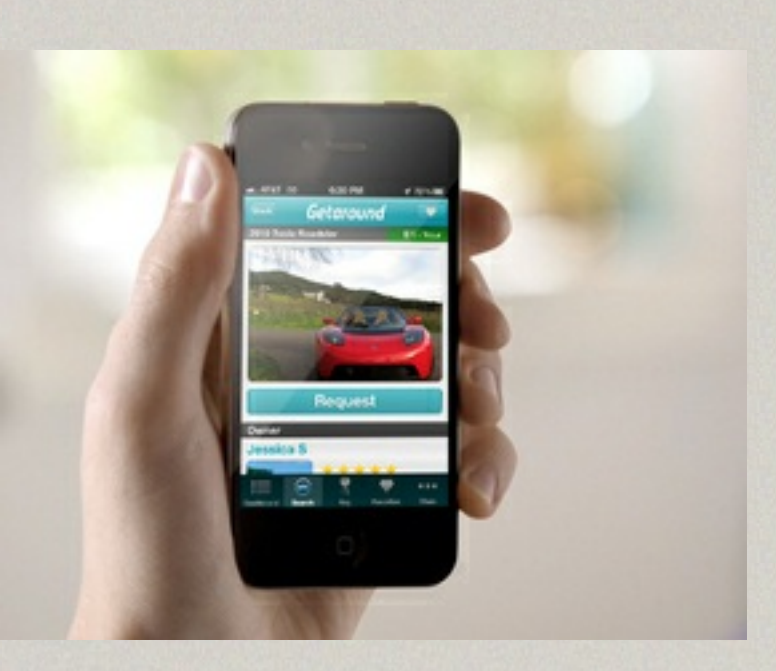




Evanston is Now Home to Peer-to-Peer Car Sharing

Did you know that the average car sits unused 95% of the time? With peer-to-peer car sharing you can rent your own car to a neighbor and make some extra money, or rent a car from someone in your neighborhood – with no membership fees if you do. Two local nonprofits are piloting just such a program in Evanston and making it easy to participate. The [Center for Neighborhood Technology \(CNT\)](#) and the [Shared-Use Mobility Center \(SUMC\)](#) are participating in an innovative new study in partnership with the car sharing operator [Getaround](#). Their goal is to expand the ways residents can move around while also limiting congestion, improving air quality, and making it possible to live well without owning a car.

Reminder About Energy Aggregation

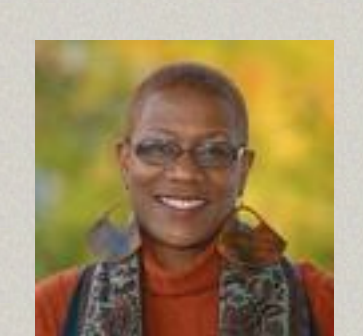


In April 2014, the City of Evanston approved a three-year contract with Homefield Energy for its electricity aggregation program, providing participating residents and small businesses with 100 percent renewable energy. Since then, CGE and the City have been made aware of electricity suppliers promoting

alternative plans door-to-door in Evanston. These suppliers do not represent the utility company or the City of Evanston, nor are they affiliated with [the City's aggregation program](#). Do not give out your utility account numbers or share your utility bills unless you intend to sign up with a new supplier.

You can opt out of or into the program at any time without penalty during the three-year contract by contacting Homefield Customer Care at 866-694-1262 or cust-care@homefieldenergy.com. You will need to provide the account holder name, address and account number.
