It's a long road, but we're on it! During <u>a joint meeting on February 20</u>, the Environment Board and the Equity & Empowerment Commission recommended changes to the Environmental Justice Resolution. If these two groups approve the updated resolution at their March meeting, the resolution will next be reviewed by the City's legal department, then by the Planning & Development Committee. Final stop: the City Council for adoption.
