A Message from CGE President Rachel Rosner



Environmentalists collectively exhaled on January 20th when an administration with an understanding of the climate crisis took office. But we know that our work has just begun. While things are headed in the right direction on the national level, we have a unique opportunity in Illinois and in Evanston to light the path towards a climate justice future.

On the state level, we must pass the <u>Clean Energy Jobs Act</u> (CEJA) to set Illinois on the path to 100% renewable energy while ensuring green jobs,

especially for marginalized communities. Our state representatives are champions of this bill, but it still helps to let them know they can count you among its supporters. It is also important to write or call Governor Pritizker and urge him to pass CEJA. Passing CEJA will make implementation of Evanston's historic Climate Action and Resilience Plan that much easier. Please urge your Representatives and your Alderman to support CEJA.

Speaking of Aldermen - there are numerous important races in Evanston, with <u>a primary on February 23 and a general election on April 6</u>. Make sure you know where the candidates stand with respect to CARP implementation. We need leaders who understand the intersection of equity and sustainability and will thus make CARP the lens through which all city decisions are made. Keep any eye out for the results of CGE's candidate survey to inform you on the subject. CARP is a powerful and historic plan, but we need leaders who understand that we must implement it fully and swiftly in order to meet its ambitious and crucial goals.

Can We End Plastic Pollution?

The COVID crisis means more takeout food, which means an exponential increase in plastic waste. But we could soon have an option to order out from restaurants without taking in so much additional

distributes reusable containers for restaurants to use for takeout and delivery. They began circulating a petition at the end of last year to gauge support in

the Chicago area for their system. Climate Reality Chicago and the Shedd Aquarium are sharing the Dispatch petition. And now CGE is too, because Evanston can be part of this. Sign the petition here. When asked, please indicate the Evanston restaurants you want to be part of this.
