Please Help the City Limit Leaf Blowers

We know – we're preaching to the choir here. But have you done everything you can to help the movement? June is a big month, because new limits are being proposed in coming weeks regarding both Evanston leaf blowers and parkway gardens. So if you haven't already done so, please write your aldermen, asking them to vote FOR the proposed limits on leaf blowers, and <u>sign the petition</u>. Please also ask the City to revise the proposed parkway garden ordinance to *encourage gardens* by not imposing strict prohibitions and fines because natural gardening is better than turf grass for clean air, clean water, and biodiversity.

Conserving the Endangered Rusty Patched Bumble Bee

The native rusty patched bumble bee population has declined *over* 87% in the last twenty years. To make sure that it continues to exist here, the <u>Evanston Host</u> <u>Plant Initiative (EHPI)</u> is collaborating with community members to help them grow some <u>38 host plants native to Illinois</u> that the bee relies on. These plants include hyssop, echinacea, and wild bergamot, which are also beneficial for other pollinators.
