
How Do You Not Buy Stuff for One Year?

What You Need to Know About Evanston and Water



Water is everything. Make sure you're on top of how to manage it and are prepared for weather incidents by checking out these City programs:

- Get rain alerts from City Evanston experiences two to three highintensity rain events each year. City of Evanston "Rain Alerts" will notify subscribers when intense rain is in the forecast for Evanston. <u>Sign up</u> <u>here</u> for text messages or email notifications to help you reduce the risk of basement and street flooding during heavy rain events.
- Monitor your water usage online The City is offering community members and businesses the ability to monitor their water consumption through its <u>WaterSmart software portal</u>.
- Affordable Water/Sewer Rate Program Evanston community members who qualify for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) can receive a reduced rate for water and sewer services provided by the City of Evanston. - Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program This program provides funds to assist low-income households with water and wastewater bills.
